## Introductory note

### A. HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF ITALIAN LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE (SILL)

As an annexe to the Faculty of Philosophy of the AUTH, the Institute of Foreign Languages was created with Act 5139 of 1931, but commencement of its operation was considerably delayed: the department of English operated in 1950-51, the department of French in 1954-55, and the departments of German and of Italian language and literature in 1960-61.

The Italian department admitted its first students in 1961 and held its first graduation ceremony in 1965. For about a decade the department operated with very few students and tutors, in small rented premises around Navarinou square in downtown Thessaloniki. In the mid-1970s the department moved to the Faculty of Philosophy premises on the AUTH campus.

The Higher Education Act (1268) of 1982 (and its supplement, Act 1566/1985) re-organized the Faculty of Philosophy. It abolished the Institute of Foreign Languages and upgraded the four foreign-language departments into full-status independent schools. In 1983-84 the SILL admitted 60 new students.

The SILL attained full self-government in 1990, when it had a faculty of five professors, the required minimum to establish its own General Assembly. Today the School has a faculty of fifteen, and awards its own Degree in Italian Language and Literature, MA degrees, and the PhD.

## **B. STUDYING IN THE SILL TODAY**

*(The following information is drawn from presentations by colleagues S.Stavrakaki (2010), N.Christodoulou (2011, 2012) and A.Ventouris (2013) in Careers Bureau conferences on studies in AUTH).*

### **Undergraduate studies**

The degree course normally extends over 8 semesters and is worth 240 ECTS.

All SILL courses are grouped in 7 scientific Domains:

1. Italian language (according to the European framework B1-C2)
2. Linguistics
3. Didactics of languages
4. Translation
5. Literature
6. Culture
7. Other: foreign languages, using the new technologies, etc.

In their fourth year of studies students are offered the option of doing practical training, worth 12 ECTS.

### **Postgraduate studies**

(1) Postgraduate Diploma of Specialization (PDS), lasting 4 semesters, and offered in 3 alternative Directions: Theoretical and Applied Linguistics

Translation, Interpretation and Communication  
Literature and Culture.

(2) Doctoral Degree (PhD).

(3) The SILL participates in certain inter-departmental PDS's in the areas of European Literature and Culture (AUTH), and Interpretation and Translation (AUTH).

(4) The SILL also collaborates with Descartes University of Paris, France, on joint supervision of doctoral theses.

Eligible for admission to the PDS are: holders of degrees in Italian Studies,  
holders of degrees in other European languages,  
holders of degrees of Law Schools,  
journalists,  
other.

Selection for admission is based on: having credit from relevant courses in the BA,  
having knowledge of other foreign languages,  
publications,  
an interview focused on the proposed research plan.

#### **SILL collaboration with European universities**

#### 1.2. University structure and governing bodies

Here follow the various structural units of the University and the **governing authorities** (according to the relevant legislation: Act 4009/2011 “Higher Education Institutions: structure, function, assurance of quality of studies, and internationalization”, as amended by Acts 4025/2011, 4076/2012, and 4115/2013):

##### **Council** of the university

In universities with more than 50 Professors (like the AUTH), the Council is made up of 15 members: 9 internal and 6 external. Eight of the internal members are Professors or Associate Professors, and one is a student representative. Council sittings can be attended (without right of vote) by the Rector and a representative of each category of staff described in articles 28 and 29 of Act 4009/ 2011, when matters related to them are discussed.

##### **Rector** of the university



Eligible for election to the office of Rector are Professors of Greek or foreign universities who are Greek nationals and speak Greek fluently, and who also have recognized academic authority and significant managerial experience. The Rector appoints (subject to the Council's approval) the Vice-Rectors from among the Professors and Associate Professors of the university.

The **Senate** of the university is made up of:

- the Rector,
- the Deans of faculties,
- the Presidents of schools (maximum 2 from each Faculty on a rotating basis, for a 2-year non-renewable term, details fixed by the Rector),
- one representative of the undergraduate students, one of the post-graduate students, and one of the PhD candidates, for a 1-year non-renewable term,
- one representative of each category of staff described in articles 28 and 29 of Act 4009, for a 2-year non-renewable term, participating with right of vote when matters related to them are discussed.

Further details on the above are included in the University Constitution and the internal Rules.

Senate sittings can be attended (without right of vote) by the Vice-Rectors and the University Secretary.

**Faculties:** A faculty is made up of schools cultivating related disciplines; it coordinates the work of the schools and encourages them to interact for the advancement of science, of research, and of sound teaching. The governing authorities of a faculty are:

- the Dean,
- the Dean's Council,
- the General Assembly.

**Schools:** The School is the basic academic unit of the University. A school cultivates a particular discipline; it organizes its research and its programmes of studies, and awards its Degree. The governing authorities of a school are:

- the President,
- the School Assembly,
- the Heads of the departments,
- the Department Assembly.

**Departments:** They are divisions within a School, specializing in a particular area of the discipline. The governing authorities of a department are:

- the General Assembly,
- the Head.

The Faculty of Philosophy of the AUTH was created with Act 3341 of 1925 and started its operation the following year. It was the second such faculty in Greece (after the old Athenian one) and its purpose was to provide the New Territories of the north (recently annexed from the Ottoman empire in 1912) with a beacon of modern

Greek education. That purpose was well served by the new faculty, which in the following decades produced a series of brilliant educators and researchers who shaped modern Greek literary and philological thought, and who also produced new generations of competent secondary school teachers. Today the Faculty comprises eight Schools: (1) Philology, (2) History and Archaeology, (3) Philosophy and Pedagogy, (4) Psychology, (5) English, (6) French, (7) German, and (8) Italian language and literature, each awarding its own degree. The Faculty also operates museums, collections of art, archives and workshops.

#### A. General description

##### A.1. Undergraduate programme of studies

###### A.1.1. Awarded degree

Degree of the School of Italian Language and Literature of the Faculty of Philosophy of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki.

###### A.1.2. Educational goals and vocational prospects

The S.I.L.L. aims:

- to provide its students with appropriate scientific knowledge so that they become expert in:
  - the Italian language, literature and culture
  - doing research, translation and interpretation
- to cover the needs of the Greek education system in:
  - teachers
  - scholars of the Italian language and literature.





S.I.L.L. alumni may find work:

- As teachers of the Italian language and literature:
  - in state higher education
  - in state secondary education
  - in private schools.
- As translators and interpreters:
  - in the Civil Service
  - in translation bureaus
  - in various private companies
  - in publishing companies
  - in the European Union.
- As editors and promoters of publications
- As private tutors for small groups of language learners
- In the broader labour market, in cultural institutions (museums, festivals, municipalities etc).

###### A.1.3. Structure of the undergraduate studies

###### A.1.3.1. General principles

- i. The current Programme of Studies has been amended by School Assembly act 404/17.06.2013 and applies from academic year 2010-11, as described below.
- ii. According to law every course is worth certain Academic Credit Units (ACU) and certain European Credit Units (ECTS).
  - a) 1 ACU corresponds to one hour of teaching per week in the case of theoretical courses based on lecturing, or to two or three hours of teaching per week in the case of practical courses based on seminars and workshops. A student must accumulate a minimum of 120 ACU in order to receive the BA degree.

- b) 1 ECTS corresponds to 25-30 hours of total workload for a course. The workload includes class attendance, homework, library-work, writing papers, preparation for examinations and any other work done for the course. A student must accumulate a minimum of **240 ECTS** for the BA.
- iii. All the courses of the curriculum are categorized as follows on the basis of two criteria: (1) their status as prerequisite, mandatory, required elective, or optional; (2) their scientific orientation.
- iv. On the basis of criterion No 1, each course falls into one of the following four categories:

| a) |  | <b>Prerequisite.</b> These are mandatory courses which must be passed before taking another course of the same <u>Domain</u> (see details below). Prerequisite courses are taught in both semesters of each academic year. |

| c) |  | <b>Required elective.</b> A student must pass a minimum number of such courses which he can choose from the broader groups of required electives (see details below).  |
| d) |  | <b>Optional.</b> They are courses which a student may never select. (Courses from other departments of the University are considered optional; they can accrue a maximum of 20 ECTS).                                      |
- v. The minimum number of required electives that a student must pass in each Domain is as follows:
- Domain of linguistics: 3.
  - Domain of didactics and pedagogy: 3.
  - Domain of translation: 3.
  - Domain of literature: 5.
  - Domain of culture: 2.
- vi. The 240 ECTS needed for graduation must come from courses from the following categories:
- The prerequisite "Italian language 11111" : 12 ECTS.
  - The 5 mandatory Italian-language courses:  $5 \times 12 = 60$  ECTS.
  - The 5 mandatory courses in the other Domains:  $5 \times 6 = 30$  ECTS.
  - Required elective:  $16 \times 6 = 96$  ECTS.
  - Optional: 42 ECTS. Of these, up to 20 ECTS may come from other departments of the University. Also, one may get 12 ECTS in this category by participating in a practical training programme in his seventh or eighth semester of studies. A student who wishes to confine his studies to the more central courses of the curriculum may select more required-electives and fewer or no optional courses.
- vii. On the basis of criterion N°2 of par.iii. above, the curriculum categorizes its courses in seven scientific **Domains** :
- Italian language. These courses aim at developing the students' ability to communicate in Italian fluently; the goal is to reach proficiency level C2 on the scale of the Council of Europe.
  - Linguistics. These courses aim at developing the students' ability to describe and analyse natural languages (particularly Italian) both as codes and as social / communicative activities. A more appropriate name for this domain would be "Sciences of Language and Linguistic Communication".
  - Language-didactics and pedagogy. These courses aim at organising the knowledge, skills and attitudes that the students gained from the first two domains above for the purpose of teaching a foreign language. Particular abilities to be developed: planning lessons / courses, using computers, preparing learning materials, managing a class, evaluating student performance.
  - Translation. These courses aim at developing the students' ability to translate. Our graduates will be able to work as translators, editors of translations and even as linguistic mediators in the broad sense.
  - Literature. These courses aim at developing the students' ability to analyse literary texts, to study their historical and cultural background, and to compare Italian with Greek and European literary production. Our literature courses will be useful to future researchers in literature and to teachers and translators.

- 6) Culture. The content of these courses is in a sense complementary to the content of the domain of literature, although culture of course is broader than literature. Culture courses deal with political and social history, art, music, cinema, theatre, ideas, folklore, etc, all of which form a solid foundation for the future language-teacher, the translator, the linguist.
- 7) Other areas. This category includes courses that don't fit precisely in any of the above, and courses that serve the goals of all the above, like computer courses, other foreign languages, etc.
- viii. Each course bears a 5-digit code. Each digit indicates the following:
- a) The **first digit** indicates the **level of studies**:
    - 1 = undergraduate,
    - 2 = postgraduate.
  - b) The **second digit** indicates the **direction** of studies:
    - 1 = Direction of Italian studies.
    - The digit 2 is planned to be used in case of the establishment of a direction of Spanish Studies in the near future.
  - c) The **third digit** indicates the **status** of the course as follows:
    - 1 = prerequisite,
    - 2 = mandatory,
    - 3 = required elective,
    - 4 = optional.
  - d) The **fourth digit** indicates the **domain** where the course belongs:
    - 1 = Italian language,
    - 2 = Linguistics,
    - 3 = Didactics and pedagogy,
    - 4 = Translation,
    - 5 = Literature,
    - 6 = Culture,
    - 7 = Other areas.
  - e) The **fifth digit** is the course's **serial number** in the domain.
- ix. The prerequisite courses and the mandatory Italian-language courses are taught for 10 hours per week and are worth 12 ECTS each. All the other courses of the curriculum are taught for 4 h/w and are worth 6 ECTS each. Each lesson may have a maximum duration of 135 minutes (3 teaching periods). So each course meets at least twice a week.
- x. Up to 7 courses may be included in the student's semestrial registration for semesters 1-8. From semester 9 onwards, the limit is 20 courses.
- xi. Of the above, only up to 2 can be mandatory Italian-language courses.
- xii. The curriculum includes the option of participating in a practical training course worth 12 ECTS. It is open to 4<sup>th</sup>-year students (ie applicants must be registered in the 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> semester of studies). In case of remaining available positions, 3<sup>rd</sup>-year students may be accepted after passing the required interview by the Scientific Director and the relevant to the position specialist. Candidates must have passed at least half of the mandatory courses. Applicants for Italian-teaching positions must have passed courses 11111 and 11332. Applicants for translation positions must have passed courses 11111 and 11241. Applicants for language-evaluation positions must have passed course 11221.

**A.1.3.2. Rulings on examinations and assessment**

The method of assessment of student achievement is decided by each tutor, taking into account the characteristics of the course-content and the teaching-method used; it may comprise written and/or oral examinations and papers, in a continuous or final format.

Systematic attendance of all classes is a basic condition for successful learning.

**A.1.3.3. Evaluation of courses and of tutors**

Towards the end of each semester, the students have the right and the duty to evaluate their courses and their tutors, so that ways for improvement can be sought. Details for this evaluation are provided by the Quality Assurance Unit at <http://qa.auth.gr>.

**A.2. Post-graduate programmes of studies**

**A.2.1. Awarded degrees**

First Postgraduate Circle: “ MA in Italian Language and Culture”, comprising three Directions:

- a) Thoretical and Applied Linguistics
- b) Translation, Interpretation and Communication
- c) Literature and Culture

Second Postgraduate Circle: PhD entitled “Italian Language and Culture”.

**A.2.1.1. Creation**
